life.

We were privileged to be hosted at Clock Barn Hall by Isabel and Kevin Mason — the venue was perfect for our function. We are very grateful to them, to all the helpers and most of all to the donors of some very worthwhile Promises. Thank you all.

In the next few days, we are fortunate to be able to make a short presentation at the Christmas Concert being staged by the Godalming Choral Society, and allowed to take a voluntary retiring collection. It is at Charterhouse on Saturday 12th December at 7.30 pm and you can get tickets at the door.

And not forgetting in any way, the wonderful individuals and small grant makers who have donated funds over the course of the year. The Three Lions in Meadrow has made us their local Charity to support over the whole year – is anyone else able to do that for us in 2016?



<u>So what about Skillway's daily life</u>? We started the term with a three day First Aid at Work Course attended by 9 of the staff and volunteers. It was a good team building exercise as well as qualifying us all in first aid. We have again hosted a Police recruit who came to us for three days to experience working amongst young people, and I have subsequently attended a Crime Stoppers event to learn more about that and the work done at Mount Browne.

We have had a visit from a member of the Hampshire County Council team who is working on improving the training of young people to enter the construction industry and tying that in with builders, so that they can give work experience and apprenticeships to them. There was a lot of synergy with what we do and we hope to develop this link further. This also ties in with our discussion concerning the future path for Skillway – we want to stick with what we are good at, but we also regret that life is changing around us. The ways that young people are supported in acquiring skills for life and being taught manual skills is changing and there is greater emphasis on helping and supporting "NEETS" – that is "Not in Education, Employment or Training" We have looked at how we can work with these young people aged 16-19 and hope to offer some courses suitable for them. We do feel that earlier interventions have a much better chance of success, but have to work within the real world.

We are continuing to offer some segments of BTech and are expanding the specific topic areas with a few pupils.

So what are the challenges ?

Well they are **big** ones: The economic climate in the country is affecting many parts of life – some very visible, some behind the scenes. Young people are not supported as well as they have been and Charities are taking more of the strain in offering interventions. But Charities are also now all trying to source the same diminishing stream of grants and funds and charitable donations. Skillway is affected by this – there is no denying it. We will bend with the wind and do what we can to adapt to the circumstances but life is tough. This is where maybe YOU as a reader of this Newsletter can help us:

- We want / need donations, big and small. Blunt, but true.
- We would like the names of people who can influence donations an introduction if you like to philanthropists and benefactors and grant-making trusts or organisations who might be able to help us
- We also need someone with multi-media art skills who would like to volunteer to help teach some challenged young people on a Monday at the workshops they are great kids underneath, but emotionally vulnerable.
